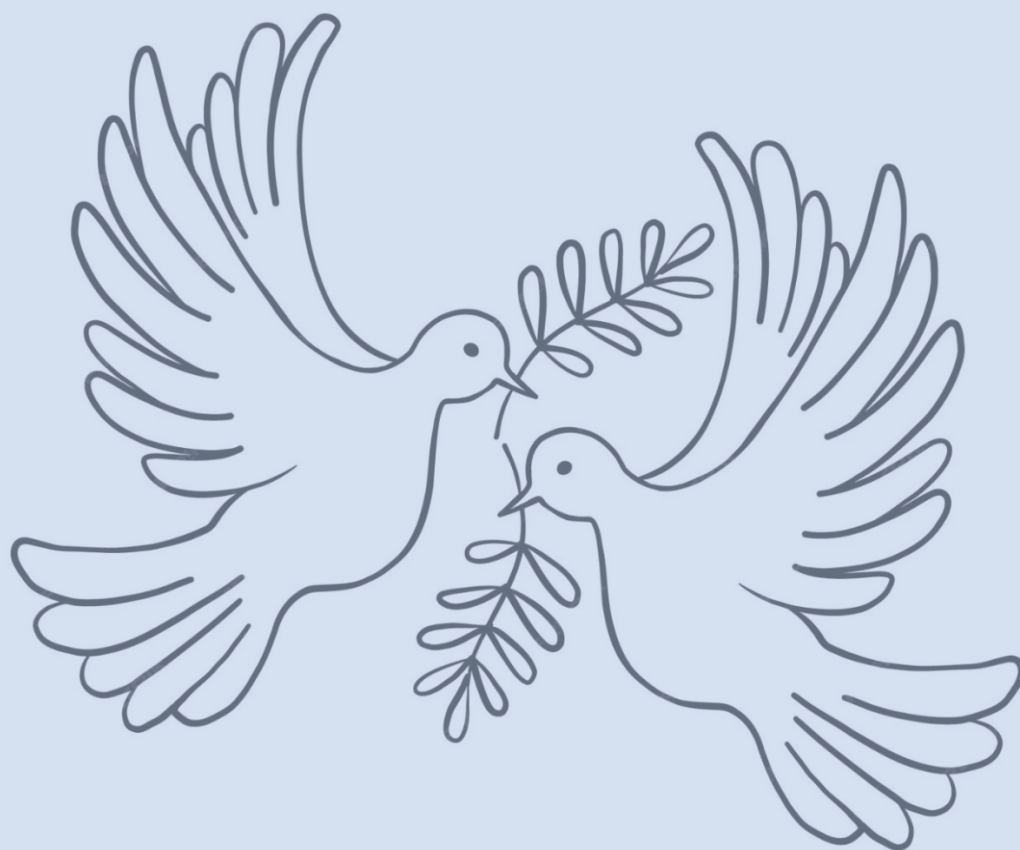

From the Rector

As the last of the Christmas lights fade and the decorations are packed away for another year, January can sometimes feel a little grey. The festivities are over, the days are still short, and many of us find ourselves longing for spring. Yet this quieter time of year has its own gifts — a chance to pause, to take stock, and to begin again.

The Christmas story, after all, doesn't really end on Christmas Day. The shepherds return to their flocks, the wise men continue their long journey, and Mary and Joseph begin the humble task of raising the child entrusted to them. Life goes on — but everything has changed. God has entered the story, and nothing will ever be the same again.

That's a message for us as we begin a new year. We may not know what the months ahead will bring — joys or challenges, surprises or sorrows — but we do know that God goes with us. The same light that shone over Bethlehem still shines in our world, and in our lives, if only we look for it. However uncertain the road ahead, we walk it in the company of Christ.

For the Church, January also brings the feast of the Epiphany, when the wise men follow a star and offer their gifts to the Christ Child. We keep this Feast on Sunday 4th January with our usual 8am Prayer Book Communion Service and then at 9.30 our Family Service where young and old are invited to dress up as Kings, as we place the Wise Men in the Manger Scene. It is a beautiful reminder that faith is a journey of seeking — of following the light wherever it leads. The gifts they bring — gold, frankincense, and myrrh — speak of worship, sacrifice, and love. Perhaps this January we might think about what gifts we offer to God in our own lives: our time, our compassion, our willingness to serve others, our desire to live with kindness and hope.

In village life, January often feels like a moment to breathe after the busyness of December. It's a time for putting the kettle on, for reconnecting with neighbours, for noticing those who might be struggling, and for simple acts of care that make community life so rich. The warmth and generosity that shine so brightly at Christmas need not fade with the tinsel — they can become the steady light that carries us through the year ahead.

Here in Balcombe, as we step into 2026 together, my prayer is that this will be a year of peace and renewal for us all — a year when we grow in faith, friendship, and hope. There will, no doubt, be challenges ahead for our world and for each of us personally. Yet as a community, we can face them with courage and compassion, knowing that the God who came among us in Christ continues to walk beside us.

So as the New Year begins, may you find strength in the small things, joy in unexpected places, and light even on the greyest days. And may the blessing of God — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit — be with you and those you love, now and always.

As we look back at 2025, I cannot believe that throughout the summer all I was thinking about were drought resistant plants, and as I write this now, the rain has kept on coming! Lawns are waterlogged and there has been a need to move potted plants out of their saucers so they do not rot. Such are the joys of gardening, which makes our next event, our AGM on Friday 6 March, all the more welcome. We are looking forward to seeing you then, when we can all unite in swapping top tips to get on top of these problems and enjoy a moan over a glass or two of something. Details to follow.

Top garden Jobs for January:

1. Prune apple and pear trees
2. Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
3. Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
4. Disperse worm casts in lawns
5. Inspect stored tubers of dahlia, begonia and canna for rots or drying out
6. Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
7. Start forcing rhubarb
8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
9. Protect outdoor peaches and nectarines against peach leaf curl with polythene
10. Don't forget to keep putting out food for the birds

DIGGING LIFE

TALES FROM A BALCOMBE ALLOTMENT

SUSSEX WILDLIFE TRUST: The “No” Year Resolution

Happy New Year! However you choose to celebrate, I hope your festive season was full of peace, joy, and mega loads of cheese. I always have a new year’s resolution and try to make them positive. Apologise less. Dance more. Wear the shoes. Before you stop reading for fear of me going full ‘live, laugh, love’ don’t worry, I’m heading somewhere.

2026 is going to be the year of boundaries. As well-meaning humans, and especially in the UK, we can be a little too agreeable, put up with stuff, get on with it. But as nature illustrates, it doesn’t have to be this way. There are not many better boundary-setting role models than those species who ward off others as standard. Camouflage antithesis, these creatures make themselves obvious to warn incomers that they’re not to be messed with. It’s called aposematism, a defence mechanism utilised by certain species across the board, invertebrates, plants, mammals, birds, fish and fungi. Told you I had a point.

There are a few different types of aposematism.

Aposematic colouration: deliberately bright colours to visually warn of a toxic taste to others (whether this is true or not). Think ladybirds, wasps and Cinnabar moth caterpillars, who are bright yellow to mirror the toxic traits taken on by their favourite food plant – Ragwort. Then there are Cuttlefish, whose colour-changing skills give them the option of disguise or bold vibrant attack.

Olfactory aposematism: repelling predators by producing a smell or foul-smelling substance. This dirty card is played by several species of shield bug, sometimes harshly but accurately known as stink bugs. Many plants are notable for this feature, including the strong-smelling Wild Garlic.

Auditory aposematism: sound as a deterrent. Many species make alarm calls to expose a nearby predator, like a Robin tick-ticking at the sight of a cat. But auditory aposematism is making a sound to directly warn of one's own danger or distaste to others. A famous example is the Rattlesnake, which clatters its tail to give the heads up - “it’s not worth it mate”. Closer to home, the Garden Tiger moth rubs its wings together to make a rasping noise to the same effect.

Symbolic or tenuous, there’s no doubt these creatures have mastered the art of communicating their boundaries. In nature there’s no awkwardness, no deeper meaning, no overthink – imagine! So, in nature’s honour, this year I’ll be saying a lot more ‘no’. Hopefully with no need for any olfactory assistance.

BALCOMBE COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH.



It's not very sexy, but it addresses an issue that many villagers complain about: speeding through the village. It matters in Balcombe because our through roads have mostly narrow or non-existent footways, making pedestrians vulnerable to passing vehicles.

The busier the roads are, generally the slower the traffic. It is when the roads are quiet that drivers have free reign to speed through the village.

The Balcombe Community Speedwatch group aims to challenge drivers and remind them of the speed limits in the village. In addition, drivers who are recorded speeding are reported to the Police and letters are sent to the registered keepers. The objective is to ultimately reduce death and injury on the road. Other benefits are to increase awareness of inappropriate speed.

Regular sessions roadside reminds drivers to get into the habit of slowing down through the village, which is why I would really like to recruit a couple more volunteers to help that cause. If you have an hour free every so often, you will make a difference.
